Risk of a visitor falling or injuring themselves	There are risks for those with limited mobility through negotiating steps. 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Risks of injury to children	Young children might suffer injuries through playing in the garden, running off the property, or playing with craft materials.	Children are only permitted to use Breathing Space when accompanied by an adult; parents or guardians are advised that they are responsible for supervising their children at all times. The garden pond has been fitted with a safety grid to prevent any risks of drowning. All water butts are raised and covered. Both gates to the garden can be shut when families are present.
